MEMORIAL T-SHIRT WORKSHOP

At the monthly meeting on September 2nd, we will hold a T-shirt-making workshop. The workshop, which will take place during the sharing group time of the meeting, will help members make Memorial Shirts for the Memorial Walk that will be held on October 2nd at Quiet Waters Park..

Here's what you will need if you would like to make a shirt: 1) a photograph of your child, 2) a T-shirt (or sweat shirt, short-sleeved or long-sleeved) -- white or very light gray works best, and 3) butterfly fabric or other fabric of your choosing that represents your child to be ironed on the shirt. You can iron wonder-under (available at any fabric store) on the fabric and cut out your designs ahead of time.

We will provide the transfer sheets and will have some butterfly fabric ready to cut at the meeting. (If you wish to put the photo onto transfer paper before coming to the meeting, please use Avery 8938.) Samples of last year's shirts will be there for ideas. Please see photo on page 9.

Bring your imagination and a pair of scissors.

Upcoming Meeting Topics

September 2: Holidays and Special Days

The holidays, particularly those in November and December, can be very difficult for bereaved parents. Carol Benjamin, a professional therapist, will discuss these issues and offer suggestions on preparing for and dealing with holidays and significant dates such as Thanksgiving, Christmas, Chanukah, Mother's Day, Father's Day, Valentines Day, the birthdate of the child, the deathdate of the child, the day the child would have first gone to school, etc.

October 7: Loss of a Child with Special Needs

Parents who are grieving the death of a child who had special needs, often find themselves dealing with additional issues. Sandra Arán, a member of our chapter, will discuss the different problems faced by these parents, including grappling with insensitive comments, complicated feelings of guilt, the "gifts" the special child brought them, the impact of the death of the child on their own lives which were devoted to the child's care, etc.
